There are lots of ways to reuse things yourselves without throwing them away. Things that you can do, and encourage other people to do.

Here are some 'disposable'—throwaway items. Draw or write down some ideas of what you could use instead:






Did you come up with lots of ideas?

A lot of disposable stuff is made of single use plastic (things that we usually buy, use once and then throw away) but there are often reusable things to use instead.



You can also save money if you buy reusable items. They might be more expensive when you first buy them but over a year you will be saving money. E.g.







By using something and throwing it away you are also wasting resources (if you don't know what this word means, can you find out?). All materials have to come from somewhere on earth. Recycling, if you can, is better than putting it in the Rubbish bin but it still uses up resources to collect and recycle. **Reducing** by **reusing** is far better for the earth's resources.

It all adds up to a huge waste.

If you throw it in the Rubbish bin it will end up at the Energy From Waste plant where it will get burnt. What a waste. Think what you could do with it instead?





It is much better to Reduce the amount we use so there is less to throw away.



Here are just some ideas of what to do with them instead. Can you think of any other ways to reuse?

Some charity shops are starting to do collections during lockdown when they are allowed.



Revamp old furniture.







Turn old clothes into something else like this t shirt bag.





Repair your bike if you have one. Lockdown is a good time to learn how to do this.





Swap or share toys with your siblings. After lockdown think about giving them to a charity shop. Remember if they go in the bin they end up being burnt. What a waste.



On the next page is our Might Be Useful sing-a-long song—why not make a Reuse shaker to shake along to our song. Find clean items from your recycling and old bits of fabric.




Any old container with a lid will do, even a box or yoghurt pot. I also found a free catalogue which had been put through my door (make sure your adults say it's ok to use), wrapping paper and fabric, even an empty shiny rice bag.

I used some milk bottle lids to fill it up to make the noise.

Can you see what they used from recycling to make them?






















Reduce, reuse, recycle

Be smart play your part—cut out and colour in these pledges (promises).







Make a Tetrapak juice carton wallet



Ask an adult for any help cutting or using scissors/butter knife.

Templates are on the next 2 pages.

These are for a 1 litre carton and one where the top is not flat!





INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Carefully open out the carton where it is glued at one edge and flatten out the whole thing.
- 2. Tape and trace the template on the blank side of the carton, lining up the carton lines with the template. Make sure to also line up the spout hole. Trace the dotted lines, a biro is good, and press hard so you can see an indent in the carton where the lines are. Cut out the shape from the carton.
- 3. Using scissors cut out the lower hole. Score all the dotted lines—you could also use a butter knife. Use a ruler to get the lines straight.
- 4. Following the dotted fold lines you created in the semi circles, make accordion type folds i.e. one way and then the other, each side.
- 5. Tightly squeeze the accordion folds. Fold the top down pushing the spout through the hole. Screw on the lid to keep wallet closed and hey presto!
